Dear Friends,

In my first week as a Scattergood employee in July 2020, Ruth Hampton '85, Clerk of the School Committee, and I met at Backbone State Park. As we hiked the trail, I had no sense of our elevation or the beauty that awaited me. Then, suddenly, the forest opened onto a stunning river valley. I was awestruck.

That day, Ruth and I bonded over our shared vision: Scattergood at its full potential. We identified pressing tasks, including ISACS reaccreditation, launching the middle school, navigating COVID-19, and state safety requirements for dorm sprinklers. All but the sprinklers have been accomplished.

The magnitude of the sprinkler project sparked discussions of a capital campaign. What began as a necessity became an opportunity to dream bigger. The scope expanded to include air conditioning, dorm bathroom renovations, and a new water well to meet student needs. And the campaign itself grew to encompass annual and planned giving. This booklet details the projects and structure of the Roots & Wings Campaign.

Over the past few years, I traveled across the country to meet with Scattergoodians who expressed their love for this special place. They taught me about favorite staff members, how the school has evolved, and what has remained constant: the centering of community, the commitment to Quaker values, and the transformative nature of a Scattergood education.

I have been continually humbled by the depth of love and support for Scattergood. Thanks to the incredible generosity of Scattergoodians, we installed the new well last fall and will begin sprinkler installation this summer. With your support, we plan to renovate the dorm bathrooms and add geothermal heating and cooling systems in the summer of 2026.

Today, I'm asking you to join the Roots & Wings Campaign. Your gift will help us complete these critical projects so Scattergood remains a place of beauty, growth, and transformation. Roots & Wings Campaign

The Roots & Wings Campaign seeks to address current and future needs, rooting Scattergood in a firm foundation from which it can grow and prosper. The comprehensive campaign will reach these goals through the following areas of focus.

Annual Fund

These funds are critical to maintaining Scattergood's day-to-day operations, addressing emergency needs, and providing flexible funding for programs.

Capital Projects

Community members are the lifeblood of Scattergood–they make it so much more than a school. For many, Scattergood becomes a second home and it is important that students, parents, staff, and alumni have access to safe and comfortable facilities.

Planned Giving

By designating Scattergood as a beneficiary of an estate or retirement plan, donors can show their appreciation for the important role the school has played in their lives while providing a source of long-term, sustainable funding.







Campaign Goals


Project Descriptions

Scattergood students, particularly those who board, live with increasingly dated facilities. The Main Building and West Dorm—with their 1950's bathroom facilities, 1940's water well, and lack of central cooling—create needless discomforts and obstacles in the daily lives of our students. The capital projects of the Roots & Wings campaign address necessary structural updates that priortize student and community comfort and well-being to ensure their Scattergood experience is enhanced by their surroundings, not inhibited by them.

Dorm Renovations

- A geothermal heating and cooling system will provide energy-efficient cooling in the dorms for the first time, as well as updating an aged heating system. Cooling during hot summer months allows Scattergood to expand summer camp programs.
- For boarding students, the dorms are their homes. Renovating the communal bathrooms in both dorms will provide greater access, efficiency, and privacy to students, improving the boarding experience.

New West Dorm Bathroom Plans



Critical Systems

- The Main Building and West Dorm will be outfitted with fire suppression systems to provide a safer environment and meet state requirements.
 The Scattergood Friends School Foundation has designated a gift of over \$500,000 specifically for the sprinklers.
- In November 2024, we drilled a new well for main campus and integrated it with the preexisting plumbing.

Upon completion of these renovations, each dorm bathroom will have four toilet stalls, three sinks, two shower stalls, and a private restroom. Additionally, each dorm has an existing, private restroom in its lounge.



Strategic Plan

With a foundation in our core values and an eye towards the future, Scattergood developed a strategic plan to address the challenges faced by the school and ensure that Scattergood is positioned to better serve our students, staff, alumni, parents, and friends.

2020-2025 Strategic Plan Goals

- Audit curriculum, policies, and programs to ensure they are mission-oriented, deepen our programmatic offerings and enhance the academic and personal experience of our community members.
- Address facilities needs campus wide; bring dorms into compliance with state regulations and modernize to meet the comfort and safety standards of students.
- Create more sustainable work practices and improve compensation packages to promote expertise and stability in staff.
- Provide more opportunites for extended community members to connect and engage with Scattergood through oncampus gatherings and off-campus travel.
- Identify and address opportunities for improvement around diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging at all levels and across all areas of the school.
- Raise and sustain enrollment levels to meet capacity–16 in the middle school and 65 in the high school.









"About 40 years after I graduated, I began to think about how different my life would have been had I not graduated from Scattergood. I decided that my life would have been dramatically different, and certainly not better, if I hadn't had the Scattergood experience. I began to take more interest in the school and eventually joined the School Committee.

I served on the School Committee for ten years in the 2010s. It allowed me to see more clearly the infrastructure and financial challenges the school had always faced and to see how different the school was from the 1950s. But more importantly, I was able to appreciate how many things had remained the same. Unchanged was the academic program's emphasis on the success of each individual student, the strong sense of community, the enriching arts program, and the farm's integration into daily life. Recognizing those similarities was very heartening and reinforced my conviction that Scattergood was a valuable part of our modern society and deserved all the support I could give.

Since leaving the School Committee I've had only remote contact with the school through Scatterings, the Annual Reports, and conversations and visits with John and Ethan. I'm impressed with the growth made in the last few years. I see a much clearer sense of direction and purpose—a vision for the role the school can play in today's society. That's accompanied by a much improved financial picture and this campaign to address some of the infrastructure challenges.

This is an exciting time in the history of Scattergood. Let's all do what we can to support its promising future."
